Rationing in World War II:

"World War II (1939-1945) changed people's lives drastically. Rationing started in 1940 but was carried out until 1954, because the UK was still recovering from the war. Rationing was introduced by Winston Churchill in 1940. This ensured everybody got their fair share of food during the war.

Why food was rationed:

The reason food was rationed is because the ships that imported food to the UK would get hit by the Germans. Germans intentionally bombed the boats so that there would be a shortage of food.
